Understanding Risk Assessment

The assessment of risk for violence in psychiatric patients has growing significance in clinical, policy, legislative, and forensic decisions. The advancement of population-based and community-controlled studies of mental illness and violence, and the emergence of risk assessment measures that have found favor with the courts in quantifying future dangerousness are defining the practice, policies, and standards for risk assessment. Familiarity with the relevant research, the legal and clinical issues that shape the practice and relative merits of the different assessment tools is becoming essential to the practice of forensic psychiatry. This course will present a framework for understanding the role of psychiatry in risk assessment. The presentation will explore the strengths and limitations of various approaches to determining risk through a critical review of seminal research on the correlates of violence and the accuracy of prediction of dangerousness/assessment of risk. An analysis of the appropriate use of actuarial versus clinical assessment will be presented, as well as a review of recent critiques regarding risk assessment. Finally, an approach to the task of risk assessment that accommodates a synthesis of available research will be presented, as well as an alternative model based on assessment of functional capacity.

Forensic Psychiatry is recognized by the ABPN as a subspecialty of psychiatry. The application of psychiatric knowledge and experience to specific legal questions requires psychiatrists to act outside of their roles as clinicians. The need for expertise in the legal arena is considerable, however, residency training inadequately prepares psychiatrists to meet this important societal

need. The purpose of this course is to educate the clinician about the legal justice system, and the need for psychiatric experts. It is directed at clinicians interested in performing forensic consultations and those with some experience but little formal training in the area. It is also directed at graduating Forensic Fellows who will soon be setting up a practice. The course will examine the process of contracting with attorneys, the legal requirements for psychiatric experts, and preparation of psychiatric legal reports. Since forensic referrals that are received through channels are different from clinical referrals, we will discuss strategies for marketing these services. Forensic cases will be presented to provide examples of the above concepts. The course provides an introduction to forensic psychiatry and prepares the participant to meet the growing and changing demand for psychiatric legal evaluations.

***Forensic Evaluation and Risk Assessment
Of Juveniles***

Violent juveniles are transferred to adult court with increasing frequency. These cases often require expert psychiatric evidence. Even when adolescents remain in Juvenile Court, - where cases are complicated by the input/interests of multiple stakeholders - expert psychiatric evidence is often crucial. A comprehensive and integrative evaluation should be the foundation for such evidence. However, there is sparse guidance in the professional literature concerning the methodologies that ought to inform the forensic psychiatric evaluation of violent juveniles. Such evaluations will be the focus of this course. Common referral dilemmas will be discussed, including strategies for navigating the involvement of multiple stakeholders. Participants will review the essential components of a comprehensive child/adolescent forensic psychiatric evaluation. The significance of specific childhood experiences will be reviewed, including the influence of trauma and neglect on 1) the individual, 2) their relationship with their environment, and 3) their immature central nervous systems. The relevance of third-party information will be examined. The course will review interviewing techniques with difficult-to-engage adolescents. The use of actuarial instruments will be addressed, including their limitations and appropriate applications with adolescents. The course will use videotaped evaluations of adolescents facing charges of murder, serious assault, and threatening a public figure.

Roles of Defense Psychiatrists In Death Penalty Cases

Over the past twenty-five years, psychiatrists have been called upon to play myriad roles in death penalty cases at every procedural stage from arrest and trial to clemency and execution. This course will explore how these roles differ fundamentally from traditional assessments of sanity/responsibility and competency in noncapital contexts. The legal framework will be outlined with reference to defining U.S. Supreme Court opinions, including Woodson, Lockett, Eddings, Penry and Skipper. Through case presentations, the psychiatrist's potential roles will be examined, including explaining the crime, assessing cultural factors, quasi-therapeutic interventions to facilitate communication and cooperation between counsel and client, and development and presentation of mitigation evidence. The complex procedural path of a capital case from through all appellate stages will be delineated to show how the psychiatrist's role may change according to the history and present posture of the case. The role of the psychiatrist in cases involving ineffective assistance of counsel claims will also be covered. The course will conclude with a consideration of the unique competency issues, including competency to assist counsel in developing mitigation, waiver issues, and competency to be executed.

***On Desolation Row: The Blurring of the Borders
Between Civil And Criminal Mental Disability Law***

As mental disability law has matured, a dual system appears to have fallen into place: in civil cases, a patient is generally entitled to a relatively broad panoply of procedural and substantive due process rights in involuntary civil commitment and institutional rights decision making; on the other hand, the Supreme Court has made it explicit that defendants convicted of crimes would have fewer substantive treatment rights and that insanity acquittees could have fewer substantive and procedural due process rights at retention and review hearings than would civil patients. Recent important developments cast new light on this separation and call into question the future of a two-tiered mental disability law system. Mr. Perlin will trace the development of the two-tiered mental disability law system, review developments in AOPC law, and then on developments in SVPA law. He will next discuss the implications of the blurring effects of these developments on the future of mental disability law.
